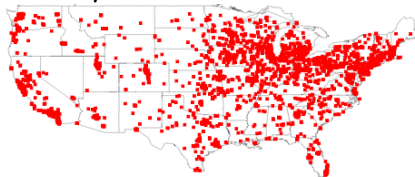

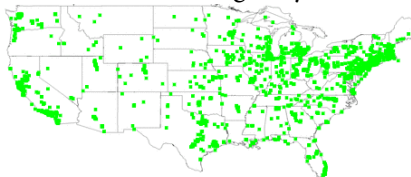

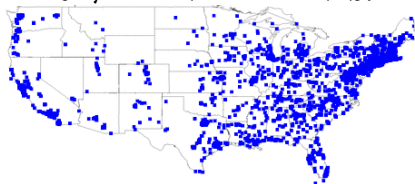
with 2 syllables ("car-ml") (38.02%)



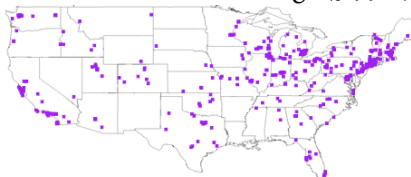
I use both interchangeably (17.26%)

Two are different meanings (3.77%)

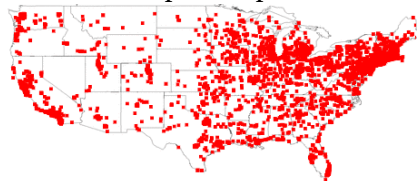

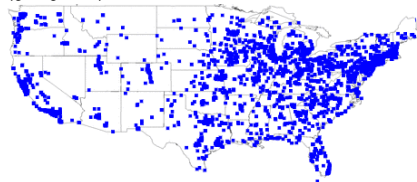
[u:] as in "coop" ("coo<sup>o</sup>pon") (66.86%)

(31.31%)

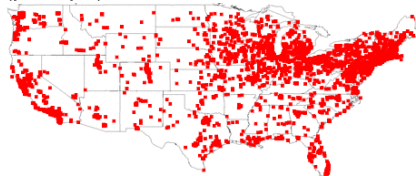

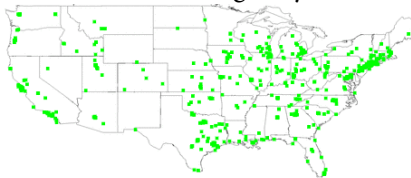

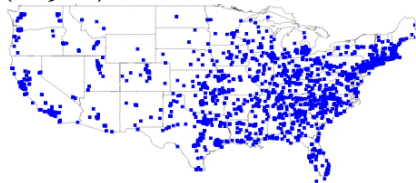
with [ɔj] as in "boy" ("loyer")  
(72.84%)



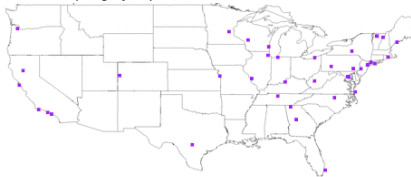
I use both interchangeably (4.86%)

other (0.34%)

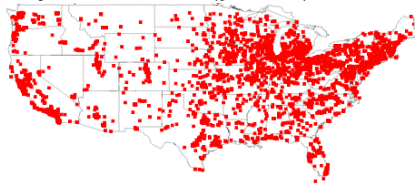

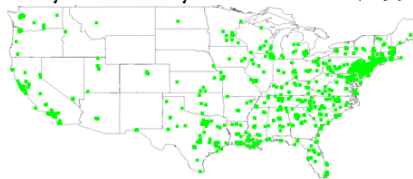
- How do you pronounce *Mary* / *merry* / *marry*?

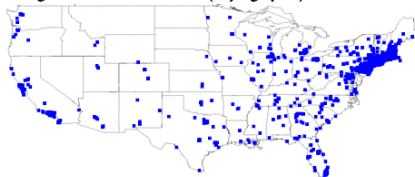
all 3 are the same (56.88%)



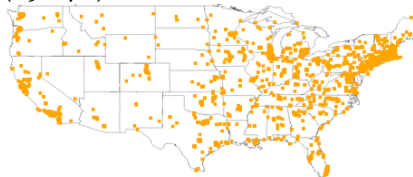
Mary and merry are the same (8.97%)

Mary and marry are the same (15.84%)



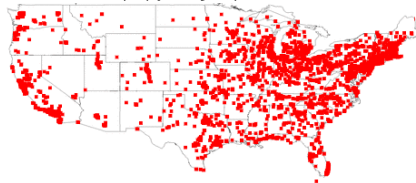

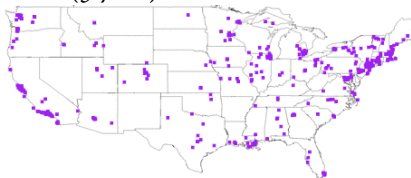
I use both interchangeably (8.81%)

other (3.71%)

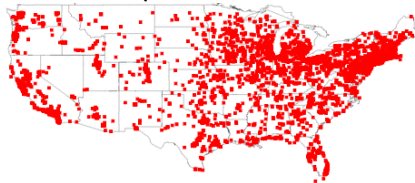

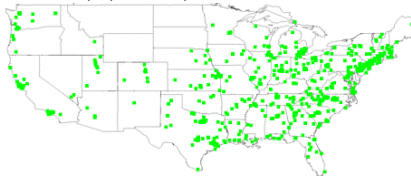

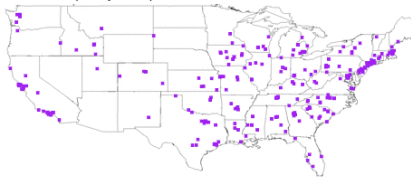
[i:] in compounds (e.g., "Sunday school") (6.12%)

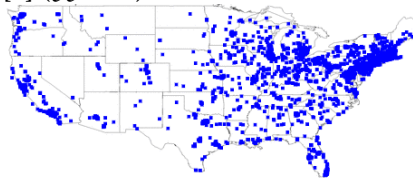

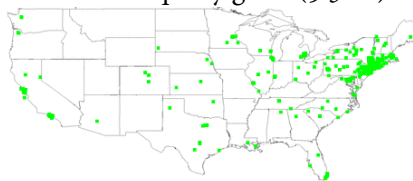

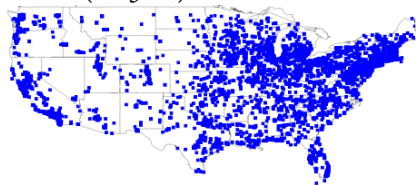
on line (5.49%)
